

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From Climate Data Gaps to Al-Driven Action

- Only 8% of global climate data is openly shared and machinereadable.
- Climate impacts cost developing countries up to 5% of GDP annually.
- Imagine turning every weather station, satellite image, and emissions record and more into Al insights for resilience and growth.



Strengthening Data Sharing for Al-Enabled Climate Platforms

Challenges with Data Sharing

- Fragmented & inaccessible climate data
- Inadequate digital infrastructure and institutional capacity
- Governance challenges & weak trust frameworks
- Limited data quality and standardization.

Activity Components

- Assess data-sharing governance for Al-driven climate action.
- Research global best practices to guide platform interoperability.
- Develop a diagnostic tool with visual analytics to identify gaps and opportunities.
- Deliver an action roadmap with short-, medium-, and long-term priorities

Assessment Framework and Diagnostic Tool

- To develop a diagnostic tool that asks a series of questions, provides results through a score, visualizations, recommendations and reporting to understand holistically a country's readiness to develop a data sharing platform for Climate action.
 - Six categories for questions:
 - Governance
 - Data availability, standards and quality
 - Institutional capacity
 - Digital infrastructure
 - Technology and tools
 - Stakeholder engagement





Scaling Impact Globally: From Pilot to Platform for Sustainable Jobs

Climate Diagnostic Tool and Al platforms are digital public goods for climate and economic resilience.

Scaling this approach will:

- Accelerate climate-smart investments and job creation.
- Strengthen data-driven policy ecosystems.
- Support resilient infrastructure planning.




Climate Diagnostic Tool

Why Should You Complete The Country Readiness Assessment?

By completing this assessment, government entities can:

- Assess Data-Sharing Readiness: Evaluate your entity's capabilities across six key areas:
 - Governance
 - Data availability, standards, and quality
 - Institutional capacity
 - Digital infrastructure
 - Technology and tools
 - Stakeholder engagement
- Receive Tailored Recommendations: Get customized, actionable recommendations based on your entity's results in these six areas to address gaps and enhance data-sharing capabilities.
- Collaborate on a National Roadmap: The results from each entity's assessment will be aggregated into a
 country-specific roadmap, designed to strengthen national data-sharing for climate action.





The platform includes three categories of user credentials:

- Admin (access to all content; can grant and revoke access to the platform).
- Focal Points (WB designated staff and country agencies personnel. Editorial access to specific country/ questionnaire; can submit responses using the platform).
- Agency experts (agencies personnel.
 Can read specific questionnaires and access respective results).



2. Begin the Assessment


After logging in, users will be guided through a questionnaire that covers the six key areas.



For each question, users can provide a respective multiple-choice answer and include additional resources such as documents and/or comments pertinent to the topic at hand.






Overview section and Progress Towards Completion

Entity-Specific Results


Receive Entity-Specific

 The results can be exported to Excel, making it easier to compile comparisons and integrate these results to other statistical tools.




Diagnostic Tool - Results

Narrative

Scoring Framework

Score 1-2: Early Stage with Critical Gaps

- Urgent areas needing attention: governance, infrastructure, capacity building
- Immediate actions:
 - Improve coordination
 - Invest in technical infrastructure
 - Build institutional capabilities

Score 3: Foundational with Opportunities for Strengthening

- There is progress towards data sharing readiness with remaining challenges.
- Basic frameworks and systems established; inconsistencies and underdeveloped areas persist.
- Potential for effective data sharing, but enhancements needed:
 - Consistency
 - Infrastructure development
 - Skill

- Score 4-5: Advanced and Functioning Well
- Score reflects strong readiness for data sharing
- Established systems, frameworks and practices support efficient data collaboration
- Entity positioned well for national and global climate data sharing efforts
- Focus on:
